Poll Worker and Polling Place Opportunities San Francisco Department of Elections

Adult Poll Worker Program

- Dedicated poll workers help maintain the integrity of the election process by serving at polling places across the City on Election Day.
- Being a poll worker is an exceptional opportunity to learn about the election process and serve your community while earning a stipend of up to \$195. To apply and learn more, visit City Hall, Room 48, M-FF between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

High School Poll Worker Program

- The High School Poll Worker program provides a unique opportunity for students to engage with the elections process, add skills to their resume, earn a stipend, and gain hands-on community service experience.

Polling Place Opportunities

- The Department of Elections is responsible for providing polling places for nearly 600 San Francisco voting precincts.
- We are currently recruiting polling places for the Election on November 6, 2018.

Voting Resources

Accessible Voting

- Paper, touchscreen, and audio ballots are available in English, Chinese (Cantonese and Mandarin audio), Spanish, and Filipino at all polling places on Election Day and the City Hall Voting Center, beginning 29 days before the election.
- An accessible vote-by-mail system is a ballot delivery option that allows voters with disabilities to access their ballot online using any assistive devices

Voting Without a Permanent Address

- People who are homeless may register to vote

- If someone does not have a “home” address:
 - Line 5: leave blank, Line 7: write in the cross streets where they most often stay (to establish voting precinct), Line 8: if possible, write in a “mailing” address so the voter can receive elections materials.

Ranked Choice voting

- In San Francisco elections, voters can select three candidates in ranked-choice voting contests.
- Candidates are listed in three columns, select only one candidate in each column, select a different candidate in each column.
